Dear parents and carers,

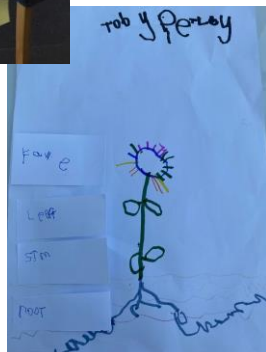
Shackadell Class

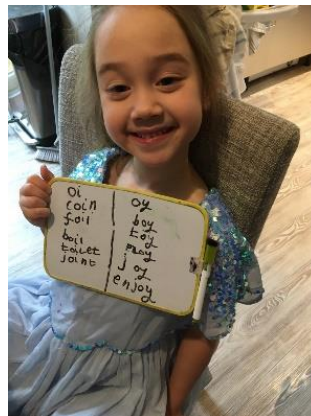
Pear tree Class

Some examples could be:

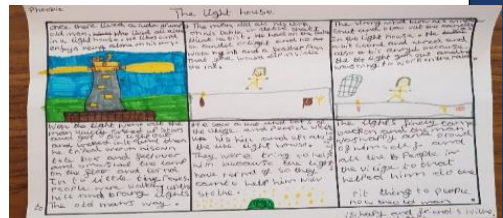
- Leave a happy note for someone to find

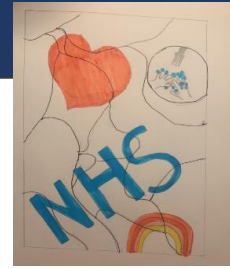
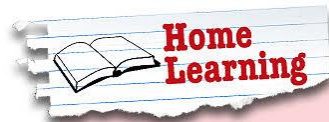

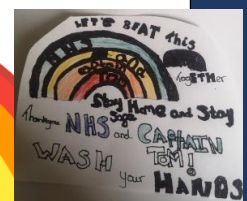
