Dear parents and carers,

However, we needn't have worried! Perhaps the timing of the VE day celebrations was meant to be; at a time when we are all living through a period of great challenge, hardship, for some personal loss and for all national loss, we remembered those who sacrificed so much and lived through, not weeks, not months but years of challenge, hardship and great loss. Whilst celebrating VE day, it would have been hard not to draw parallels between what people went through during the Second World War and the current pandemic. Lives were lost, times were so very hard but better times lay ahead and our country came out stronger. We need to remember this as we face our challenges today and over the coming weeks. On Sunday, we all learnt that, provided certain requirements are met, primary schools will reopen for some year groups after the half term break. Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 are to return to school first and the government's plan is that all other year groups will return at some point before the summer holiday. We would like to reassure you that we will be taking all measures possible to keep the children safe by following government guidelines which recognise that it will not always be possible to maintain social distancing in primary schools. As always, we will work closely with families to ensure that we are all aware of what provision in school will look like whilst also maintaining 'home learning' support for those year groups not yet in school. Please look out for further information next week regarding reopening for some year groups.

Without a doubt, for most parents teaching their children at home is a challenge; we would just like to say that we think Aston parents are doing a fantastic job. We appreciate that how this looks varies significantly from one household to another – but, everyone is doing something and trying their very best. As a result, we feel confident that the children have continued to learn, and will continue to learn, throughout their time at home. Likewise, for teachers adapting to home learning has been a huge challenge. We too have been on a steep learning curve and greatly appreciate your patience and support. Any ideas that teachers have had 'time off' is certainly not the case at Aston; planning and responding to home learning as well as running key worker provision in school is meaning that many staff are working very long hours every day. We know that these are hours well spent when we see the quality and range of home learning that is going on. This is certainly not the same picture in all schools and serves as a reminder as to why Aston St. Mary's is such a special place to work – we feel blessed to be working with our Aston families and want to remind you that you are all very much in our prayers and our thoughts.
