Dear Parents and Carers,

What an unusual half term! It was two weeks before the Easter break that schools closed; the children left with their home learning packs and some reading books to enjoy and here we are, another whole half term later, having faced so many challenges and learnt so much. Most importantly, we have all done the right thing by staying home to keep ourselves and others safe. Children, parents and teachers alike have responded to the challenges of learning at home. We have all had to adapt; we have all been on a steep learning curve and we have all needed to support each other and understand that we are all doing our very best. We would like to thank our whole school community for being simply fantastic – by working together your children have been able to continue learning whilst staying safe. As a leadership team we have been monitoring feedback from parents of all classes via Seesaw and Tapestry; we have been absolutely delighted to see such overwhelmingly positive responses. Thank you. Your comments of support really do make a difference - particularly to the teachers - who are spending many hours setting and responding to learning often whilst managing their own family commitments.

We are not at the end of this new and unusual journey yet. Assuming the government's plans don't change, then we will begin our phased re-opening on Monday 1st June. On this date, school re-opens to children in Reception, Year One and Year Six. We are not sure yet exactly how many of these pupils will return at this point; our recent survey to the relevant year groups suggests that we may be expecting somewhere over half to return whilst other parents continue to keep their children at home. As a school, we have decided that we will continue to provide home learning for all year groups to help enable parents to make whatever decision they feel most comfortable with. Detailed information was sent out earlier this week to the year groups affected about the arrangements for the phased re-opening; we have included this information at the end of this newsletter to enable all parents to be aware of what measures we have put in place to keep everyone as safe as possible in school. Obviously, all plans are subject to change in line with government advice. Arrangements will need to be adapted as additional years groups are allowed to return.

We have also loved seeing some of the other lovely things you've been doing with your families - including bike rides, baking and country walks!





His teeth, that he hadn't brushed for weeks, were yellow and smelly!







IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING THE PHASED RE-OPENING OF SCHOOL

Dear Parents and Carers of Year R, Year 1 and Year 6,

As you will be aware the government are planning the phased re-opening of primary schools from Monday 1st June 2020. School will therefore open for children in Reception, Year One and Year Six from this date, assuming there is no change in government guidance before then.

The government recognises that social distancing will not necessarily be possible in primary schools - though we will clearly do all that we can to **minimise contact** as much as possible. Most importantly, we will ensure that **good hygiene** practices are established and reinforced throughout the day. Children and staff will work in smaller groups (**'bubbles'**) and will not mix with other classes. Government advice is that **PPE** is not required in schools; should staff or children wish to wear PPE, then they will be allowed to do so; we have purchased face shields for staff, to allow children to see their faces.

The leadership team have carried out a detailed risk assessment and the purpose of this letter is to share with you the arrangements we will be making in order to minimise any risk to children, staff or parents.

Please read the following information carefully, taking note of the arrangements (in particular the timings of the school day and drop-off/pick-up arrangements) as it is essential that we have full compliance.

Government guidance for schools states:

"The safety of children and staff is our utmost priority."

"The advice seeks to support staff working in schools, colleges and childcare settings, to deliver this approach in the safest way possible, focusing on measures they can put in place to help limit the risk of the virus spreading within education and childcare settings."

"In education, childcare and social care settings, preventing the spread of the coronavirus involves dealing with direct transmissions (for instance, when in close contact with those sneezing and coughing) and indirect transmission (via touching contaminated surfaces.) A range of approaches and actions should be employed to do this."

Arrangements for re-opening

1. Changes to the timings of the school day:

We have arranged for staggered start and finish times as well as staggered break and lunch times. The school day will be shorter than usual as will lunchtimes. These timings are outlined in the table below.

2. Drop-off and collection of children - adults on site:

Only <u>one adult per family</u> should enter the school site and only at the times outlined above. We will be operating a one-way system for entry and exit from the school site:

- Entry will be via the path and onto the playground
- Exit will be via the gate to the left of the building, past Danes classroom and into the school car park.
- No adults, other than staff, are to enter the school building.
- All adults to leave the school site immediately after drop-off/pick-up.
- One adult only allowed into the school lobby.

Reception and Year 1	Children who are happy to do so should be left to enter school independently having been escorted to the playground gate. Those who need an adult to wait with them will need to queue across the playground (markers will be in place)	One adult per family should wait on the main playground being aware of social distancing. Children will be escorted to the playground by a member of staff. Please leave the site according to the one-way system.
Year 6	Children to enter school site independently (please say goodbye at the entrance to the site). Children to enter the building via Danes class fire door which will be open ready for them.	Parents to wait outside the school grounds on School Lane. The children will be escorted to the gate by a member of staff.

3. Minimising Contact and good hygiene inside school:

- There will be no contact between children of different year groups.
- There will be a maximum of 15 children in each classroom (if necessary, Year 1 will be split between Peartree and Orchard classrooms).
- Where possible, Staff will remain with a particular year group instead of working across several classes.
- Furniture will be organised within classrooms to ensure that children sit apart. Each child will have an allocated place. Clearly, this will look different for the Reception aged children as their day is structured very differently.
- Classes will agree a 'distancing charter' and children will be praised for following the agreed rules.
- Teachers will plan for children working individually instead of in pairs or groups.
- Each classroom will have an example 2m distance clearly marked as a reminder to the children.
- Coats and lunchboxes will be kept under tables to avoid busy cloakrooms. This will be organised differently for Reception children.
- Only one child from each class will use the toilets at a time (unless there is an urgent need for the younger children)
- Reception children will use their classroom toilets throughout the day, including breaks.
- Year 1 children will use the library toilets throughout the day, including breaks
- Year 6 children will use Danes class toilets throughout the day, including breaks.
- Children will wash their hands thoroughly and regularly throughout the day.
- Hand washing procedures will be demonstrated by staff and frequent reminders given.
- Internal doors will be kept open throughout the day to avoid contact and allow ventilation.
- Classroom windows will be kept open when possible.
- Staggered lunchtimes mean that Reception children and Year One children will have separate lunch sittings.
- Year Six children will eat lunch in their classroom.
- Children will not queue for their school dinner instead they will be sent in very small supervised groups to the library to ensure they are 2m apart as they wait.
- Wherever possible, classroom resources will not be shared between children.
 Instead such resources (e.g. glue sticks and scissors) will be distributed for individual use.
- Tables, door handles and other surfaces will be cleaned regularly.

4. Outside Play – Morning Break and Lunchtime

We are very lucky to have plenty of outdoor space to enjoy, especially in dry weather. We will incorporate as much outdoor learning into our timetables as possible.

- Staggered break and lunchtimes mean that each year group will be outside at different times. Should two classes be outside simultaneously, then they will play in different areas of the school grounds.
- School play equipment will be limited to items which can be easily cleaned.
- We would like to encourage children to bring their own equipment (should they wish to do so). This could be a small ball, a skipping rope or similar. These items need to be taken home each day to be cleaned.
- Appropriate games will be discussed with the children which minimise contact.

5. Well-being

We appreciate that most of the children returning to school are very young and can not be expected to fully comprehend the current situation. We also understand that periods of transition can be difficult for children; they have now spent many weeks at home and will be returning to a school which will 'feel' rather different to the school they are familiar with.

Please be assured that we will be doing everything we can to support each and every child and to meet their personal needs. Within our small 'bubbles' we will allow time just to talk and share our feelings. We are proud of how Aston children and staff look out and care for each other – this will be more important than ever as the children settle back into school.

Whilst we can no longer allow parents or carers into the building, please remember that we are more than happy to discuss with you any queries or concerns that you may have.
