We must continue to stay home. You may only exercise outdoors with one other person from a different household. No mixing in or outdoors. FAMILIES MUST NOT MIX - IN OR OUTDOORS!

29th **March:** Rule of Six is planned to return - where two households can meet up outside only.

We've made the decision to keep our play areas closed, and will review this decision weekly from now - taking into account the case rate and trend analysis - and will open them as soon as possible.

Unfortunately, while cases have continued to fall, Stevenage still has the highest coronavirus rate in the county. The 0-11 years old age group rate for Stevenage is more than twice the rate of Hertfordshire as a whole, and the 12-16 years old age rate is almost double the county rate. Therefore, we do not feel it is safe to reopen play areas at this current time. By acting responsibly now, we can play our part in helping to come out of lockdown.

Please DO NOT use play areas – they are still closed, there are signs up and padlocks on the gates. It's not fair to other families who are doing the right thing having to explain to their children why some people are still using them.

Government advice is still to stay local, so please do not travel to use play areas in other towns. Our parks and open spaces remain open for your enjoyment, and thank you for your understanding and patience.

Dear Parent/Guardian of Harry,

Thank you for taking the time to write to us.

Mondelez International is committed to eradicating deforestation in the palm oil supply and we are actively working with our suppliers to ensure palm oil is fully traceable. We have actionable steps in place to make certain that the palm oil we buy is produced on legally held land, does not lead to deforestation or loss of peat land, respects human rights, and does not use forced or child labor.

Mondelez will continue to prioritize suppliers that meet our principles and exclude those that do not. We are calling on our suppliers to improve practices across their entire operations and to engage their third-party suppliers to ensure their palm oil production is 100% sustainable and traceable. At the end of 2017, 96% of our palm oil was traceable back to mill and 99% was from suppliers with policies aligned to ours.

We're asking our direct suppliers to call on their upstream suppliers to map and monitor the plantations where oil is grown so we can drive further traceability. We're also excluding 12 companies from our supply chain as a result of breaches.

While Mondelez International accounts for only about 0.5 percent of palm oil consumption globally, we have played – and continue to play – a leadership role in global industry advocacy toward sector transformation. We chain. Our work with these organizations is based on our view that the complex challenge of producing sustainable palm oil can only be solved through collaboration with all actors in the palm oil supply sustainable palm oil can only be solved through collaboration with all actors in the palm oil supplier and buyers, as well as local and national government and non-governmental

We will continue to contribute toward our common goal of achieving palm oil sustainability.

Just a reminder that the next Happy Bag collection on Tuesday 9th March.


