

As from Monday 12th April, families are now be able to visit most Hertfordshire libraries to choose their own books. We have been buying new titles throughout the year so there are lots of exciting new books to discover, as well as classic favourites. We have switched off our Ready Reads pre-ordering service and instead families can, if they wish, pick up Grab and Go packs of preselected picture or board books and packs for adults too. Children enjoy choosing their own books and they get to explore a huge range of quality titles that they would not find elsewhere. The great thing about the library is that they can try out new authors and genres and as they are borrowing books rather than buying them it does not matter if they decide they don't like a story, it can just be swapped for a new one on their next visit, all for free. While some of the smaller community libraries are not open quite yet, we are working towards a full service over the next few weeks for details of opening times visit our website.

At the end of last term, we had so much fun taking part in lots of Easter activities. We enjoyed our egg rolling competition and seeing everyone's decorated eggs!





We have started our new History topic all about the Romans this half term and loved learning all about how the Roman empire spread this week, we worked in partners to create our own chronological timelines to show the spread of the Roman empire.





In English, we have been reading the Roman myth 'Romulus and Remus', and began our learning with role-playing the characters. This week we have been planning and writing our own Roman myths in a similar style. We have loved reading everyone's myths!

Over the last two weeks, we have been developing our cricket skills in PE. We have practiced our fielding and catching skills and working together with partners to develop our throwing skills. It has been great to see everyone working fantastically with their partners and in teams.

This week, we have also welcomed Mr Stevenson to our class, he will be joining us in Orchard class for the next few weeks and you might have already spotted him on the playground in the morning.

We are very much looking forward to another brilliant few weeks of learning. Mrs Merry, Mrs Davies and Mr Stevenson


Haffydown Class


I hope you all had a lovely Easter and enjoyed some of the restrictions being lifted. It's so wonderful to be back in school again and continuing with our learning.


In English, we have been travelling around the world with our current text "Atlas of Adventures". We have been discovering many countries, famous landmarks and festivals. We have been using our reading skills of summarising, retrieval and inference in order to fill in our own passports along the way. We will be writing postcards, radio broadcasts and our own travel guides all about our exciting adventures.



We have begun a new computing unit this half term which focuses on data bases. This week, we made branching data bases in order to sort vegetables and instruments. We had to think carefully about the yes/ no questions and the process of elimination. Next week, we will be using branching diagrams using Purple Mash.









During Year Three science, Mrs Evans was particularly impressed with the bar graphs which clearly show the results of their cress growing investigation.

Danes Class

We are so excited about the term ahead and have so many exciting learning opportunities planned for the children. It is hard to believe that Year Six are now in their final term at Aston; we will certainly be sad to see them go at the end of term, but we know that they are ready to take the next exciting step in their education.

This half term in history, we are learning about Thomas Clarkson and the Transatlantic Slave Trade. Thomas Clarkson has local connections and there is a memorial to him and his contribution to the abolishment of slavery in nearby Wadesmill. In our lesson last week, the children used a range of historical evidence to make deductions about the treatment of enslaved

people.



In English, our learning is based upon the text 'The Eye of the Wolf'. We have already become experts on wolves as well as many African countries. The text links perfectly with our learning in history as both the wolf and the boy were taken against their will. They develop an unusual bond as a result.

In maths, we are developing our algebraic reasoning. As part of this, we have revised the application of BODMAS to multi-step calculations. We are learning to solve algebraic equations and evaluate expressions.

Our learning in science this term is all about Living Things, in particular life cycles and reproduction of plants. Last week, we planted strawberry seeds – we are hoping that they will grow! Before the Easter break, we ended our Properties of Materials topic by observing an irreversible change. We saw that, when vinegar is added to bicarbonate of soda, a gas (carbon dioxide) is given off; this proved that a chemical reaction had occurred. We had so much fun!
