
Donate

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Last week, all classes at Aston St. Mary's took part in activities all about Christian Aid Week. We learnt all about how Christian Aid helps to create a world where everyone can live a life free of poverty and supports many communities. Across all classes, the focus of our activities throughout the week was the climate crisis, and how people in poverty are being affected through issues such as drought and flooding due to climate change. It was wonderful to see how engaged all of the children were when learning about these issues.

At the end of the week, all of the children's work was displayed outside on the playground (luckily we had some sunshine!) and everyone enjoyed looking at what each class had been learning. All of the children also contributed to our 'prayers for creation' where they wrote down their hopes and prayers to help look after our world. We hope you enjoyed seeing all the wonderful learning on the playground, here is what each class got up to throughout the week.



Shackadell thought about God's wonderful creation and why it is important that we look after it carefully. The children created paintings, pictures and models of some of God's wonderful creatures. They also wrote prayers of thanksgiving. They looked at things we can do to help the climate crisis and thought about recycling and reusing things. The children were excited to make flower paper. They took some scraps of paper, ripped them up, added water and pressed it to make new paper. They mixed wildflower seeds in with it so that when they have finished with the drawings, they can plant the special paper and wild flowers will grow, helping the bees that are hugely important to our world.





















Peartree looked at Christian Aid as a charity and their association with homeless people and what they do with money raised to help combat this. They read 'Wonderful Earth' and 'You're a what?' and talked about the creation of our planet and all the amazing things on it and what we can do to help protect it from damage caused by pollution on land, in the air and in seas and deforestation. They decided to do some 'upcycling' to help our planet, so they made bird feeders from plastic bottles. They talked about the planting of new trees to help towards the problem of global warming and loss of homes and habitat. They made a collage of a tree covered in spring blossom as we all agreed they are very beautiful.

Orchard Class learnt about families living in communities being affected everyday by the climate crisis. They felt very passionate about making small changes every day so wrote letters to Boris Johnson about the climate crisis, these have been posted off – let's hope we receive a reply! Later in the week they read the creation story and thought about the world God created; they created their own pastel artwork of the creation story.

In Haffydown, the children learnt all about the work Christian Aid were doing to support the climate crisis; they found out about families being affected by climate change. They talked about how we can help support the crisis and how they can make their voice heard. They created some protest banners in support of Christian Aid Week and even held a peaceful protest on Friday afternoon in the playground!



Danes class read the book 'One Plastic Bag' by Miranda Paul. It tells the true life and inspiring story of Isatou Ceesay and the recycling women of The Gambia. As part of their learning the children learnt all about this small African country. They have become experts in plastic pollution and the damage it is doing to our beautiful planet. The children then wrote their own speeches to persuade people to reduce plastic

waste.



This speech is about the effects plastic has on our environment.

Although plastic can be useful, it is eradicating our marine life rapidly due to our impulsive actions. We're destroying their habitat by just simply littering. Plastic is a threat to the animals. How do feel knowing that we're killing our maine life? They are in need of help and we can stop their suffering. In the last ten years we've produced more plastic than in the last century. Small changes have a significant impact in the world, our oceans are infested with plastic, the marine life depends on us.

We can stop this by using substitutes for plastic such as metal or even just recycle some of the plastic two consume. Everything counts: You can use sustainable items instead— we must act now and banish single-use plastic forever. I insist that we change, the animals are drowning in plastic.
