


#### **Orchard Class**

During our introduction to our topic for this term, Anglo-Saxons, the children acted like archaeologists digging up the past. They showed their inquisitive minds as they completed a puzzle to reveal an artefact, to then create a theory as to what it might be and what it told us about the Anglo-Saxons.

We are very excited to see the children's learning over the coming year.









### **Puddlebridge Class**

Puddlebridge class have made a wonderful start to the new school year. We spent the first few days getting to know each other and settling in. During this time, we discussed what it means to part of the Puddlebridge team and agreed on a set of rights and responsibilities for us to follow in our class charter. We also spent some time creating a stained-glass cross to display in our reflection zone and wrote prayers to add to our prayer box.



We have started thinking about our history topic, 'Brave and Beautiful Britain'. We now have a good understanding of the events that led up to the start of WWII and are looking forward to finding out more about the Home Front.

In English, we have started reading 'Letters from the Lighthouse' by Emma Carroll. The book tells the story of Olive and Cliff who have been evacuated to the Devonshire coast during the Second World War. We will be using this text as a stimulus for our writing over the next couple of weeks. In Maths, we have enjoyed taking part in a 'Week of Inspirational Maths' that has helped us to understand why a growth mindset is so important across all of our subjects.





### **Danes Class**



In English, we are reading 'Goodnight Mister Tom' by Michelle Magorian. This is a classic text which tells the story of a young evacuee called William Beech who develops a very special bond with the kind, old Mister Tom. This wonderful story will provide us with many opportunities for writing as well as developing our vocabulary. We have started our mathematical learning journey with 'A Week of Inspirational Maths'. We have learned that everyone is capable of doing well at maths and that it is important to make mistakes and be challenged. A growth mindset will help enable the best possible progress in all areas of the curriculum.

Danes class really have made a fantastic start to the new school year. It has been lovely to welcome the Year Five children into the class; as Year Five are now split between Danes and Puddlebridge, the two classes will be working closely together throughout the year. We will be studying the same topics and the Year Five children from Puddlebridge are joining us for science lessons every Wednesday. This term our topic is called 'Brave and Beautiful Britain' and will include historical learning about World War Two as well as a geographical study of the
