

In English, we have been doing some super work on adjectives to describe all the different sticks in our class book 'Stanley's Stick'. We have also begun to write our own version about our own sticks.










We have also had some fun with nature and created our own 'Leaf' characters using some interesting leaves with lovely colours that we gathered whilst on a brief walk outside of the school.




Orchard Class

We have had a fantastic first half term in Orchard! We have all been inspired by our history topic – The Sinking of The Great Titanic and have been fascinated by this significant event in history. I have been very impressed with the variety of different home learning projects the children have produced. From posters to cakes, models and diaries, it is clear that a lot of fun and learning has taken place. In our final lesson, we became archaeologists. We asked and answered historical questions about a range of artefacts found at the wreckage. Finally, we pondered the question, "should the site be treated as a grave site or an archaeological site?" The children came up with some very thoughtful responses.







Haffydown Class

Haffydown have been working super hard!

In English, we have started examining a new poem called 'Overheard on a Saltmarsh'. We have been expanding our vocabulary by discussing amazing adjectives for our initial impressions of the nymph and goblin. We had a fantastic lesson where the children acted out their favourite part of the poem. We had some wonderful nymphs and some very scary goblins!



In Maths, we have been focusing on mental addition. The children have done an excellent job understanding that addition is commutative and using the compensation method. I have been incredibly impressed with how quickly they have made progress.

'What conditions affect the growth of a plant?' was the question we worked on in Science. The children have designed and completed an experiment where they removed one variable that a plant needs to discover how this affected the plant. We had some great results and we will continue to see how our beans grow.



In History, we have focused on what Anglo-Saxon houses were made from and the jobs adults and children did around the village. We made some brilliant posters advertising typical Anglo-Saxon jobs.

Puddlebridge Class

This week, we have enjoyed a whole day of Design and Technology. Working in groups, we were set the challenge of designing and building an authentic looking model of an Anderson Shelter. Our shelter had to include a strong framework in order to withstand bombing from The Blitz. We also had to make sure that the shelter was durable, functional, and stable. While this project helped us to deepen our understanding of WWII shelters and building structures, it also taught us lots about the importance of thorough planning, time management, economic use of resources, and working as a team.



Great work Puddlebridge class – you all deserve to have a wonderful half term and we will look forward to seeing you all again after the break.
































HOME SCHOOL VALUES

TALK ABOUT TRUTHFULNESS TOGETHER.

'I promise to tell the **truth**, the whole **truth** and nothing but the **truth**, so help me God'

In a court of law a witness swears an oath on the Bible or another sacred text, but sometimes in everyday life people find it more difficult to be **truthful**.

Talk together about occasions when complete honesty could cause trouble or be hurtful. For example:

- When a member of your family asks you if you like their new shoes
- When telling the **truth** will get your friend into trouble
- When someone asks what you are thinking but the answer would hurt their feelings

READ TOGETHER... A Day That Changed Everything

It began just as any other day.

Peter the fisherman was mending his nets as he always did.

HALL OF FAME

Aung San Suu Kyi

For many years the nation of Burma was ruled by their ruthless army which refused to allow the ordinary citizens to have free elections to choose their leaders. If Burmese people spoke openly about politics they were thrown

into prison or even killed. But a tiny brave woman called Aung San Suu Kyi refused to be silent about the **truth** of what was happening in her country. She campaigned openly but peacefully in the streets and around the world for Burma to have free elections. For this the army put her under house arrest, keeping her prisoner in her own home for 20 years! Whilst under arrest she was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for being 'an outstanding example of the power of the powerless'

In 2010 Aung San Suu Kyi was finally freed by the army just after free elections were held in Burma for the first time. On her release thousands of people gathered to welcome and thank her for standing for truth and democracy and helping to bring about change in Burma.
