Curriculum Enrichment

We are delighted that so many children are participating in our range of lunchtime and after school enrichment opportunities. This week, children in Key Stage One thoroughly enjoyed craft club after school on Monday and children in Shackadell class were the first to enjoy cookery club after school on Wednesday. It was wonderful to see the skill of such young children when chopping vegetables to make their own mini pitta bread pizzas. They looked delicious!





Multisports after school on Mondays is popular with children of all ages, as is football after school on Fridays. It is wonderful to see so many children participating in these popular clubs every week. Netball club is resuming next week; this will usually take place during lunchtime on a Wednesday for children in Key Stage Two (places are limited so priority will be given to Years Five and Six in the first instance).

We are very proud of our school orchestra which practises after school on Tuesdays; not many primary schools are able to offer this and, despite being a small school, we have children playing a range of instruments including violins, wind instruments, keyboard and percussion.

Breakfast Club

This runs every morning from 8:00am in the school hall. Please contact the office should you wish your child to attend. Whilst we have capacity to do so, children can attend either every day, on specified days each week or on an ad hoc basis. They enjoy toast and cereals for breakfast and then enjoy activities such as puzzles, games, building with lego etc.

Shackadell Class

To bring our topic of "people who help us" to an end, we had a special visit from our local fire-brigade. The children learnt lots of information about what is stored inside the fire engine, what they wear to protect themselves and found out the things fire fighters do other than putting out fires. They even put on their blue lights and siren for us as they left the school! The children thoroughly enjoyed their visit and learnt so much from this first-hand experience. In geography, this half term we will be learning about the countries in the United Kingdom and taking a tour of some of its famous landmarks. We are also learning about the changes in weather throughout the year. We have watched video clips about different weather types in the UK and documented what we observed. 


In science, we are continuing the unit on Everyday Materials and will be doing some very exciting investigations where we will be testing different materials and finding the ones most suitable for a given purpose.

In RE, we will be looking at why Easter is important to Christians and the sequence of events leading up to Easter Sunday. We watched the Easter story and then played 'Pass the Parcel!' Each layer contained a part of the story and layer by layer we had to retell the story together.

In the middle was a box of chocolate mini-eggs! We talked about eggs being symbolic of new life and that is why people receive chocolate eggs for Easter.













Orchard Class

Before half term, Orchard spent a whole day learning about the sculptor and environmentalist Andy Goldsworthy and exploring his outdoor sculptures. We learnt about how he uses natural materials and the environment to create his pieces. In groups, we created our own outdoor sculptures using natural materials such as wood, sticks, stones, leaves, pinecones and chalk. We also used string, ribbon and glue made from water and flour to attach our materials together. Once we had created our master pieces, we took our own photographs for our sketch books.



This half term in history, we will be learning about "Nurturing Nurses, in particular Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. We will explore what makes them so significant and the impact they had.

In science, we will be learning about plants and investigating the process of germination. Please look out for the home learning grids in your child's book bag which have been sent out this week.

We have kicked off this half term by starting a new unit in English based around the poem *Hurt No Living Thing* by Christina Rossetti. In the poem, she describes a range of mini beasts in a way that makes them sound precious and fascinating. We worked in groups to find out about a range of different creatures and described them in a positive way in preparation for writing our own poetry.


In PSHE, we are thinking about the VIPs in our lives and how we can show them that we love them. We worked together to think of words that we associate with loving relationships (left).

In Science, Year 4 thoroughly enjoyed making and testing cup telephones to explore our new topic: Sound.




Danes Class

Last half term in art, Danes focussed on capturing movement when drawing the human form. We looked at how to draw figures in the correct proportion and then captured different poses showing balance and motion. We studied the pen and ink drawing 'Vitruvian Man' by Leonardo da Vinci before recreating this ourselves. Our final piece linked in with our learning in science as we drew the evolution of man according to scientific theory.



This half term is a particularly busy one for Year Six as they await their secondary school allocations and are working hard to prepare for their SATs assessments in May. Their commitment to learning, dedication and ambition is exceptional. They never cease to amaze me with their thirst and enthusiasm for learning. This is not only demonstrated in school, but also through their home learning; they are completing three home learning tasks every week and are always eager to receive feedback as to what they have done well and how they can improve further. In maths, we are exploring our understanding of percentages. We investigated splitting a 'whole' into a number of percentages before calculating the value of each part and then checking these could be recombined to make the 'whole'.

In English, we are focussing on explanation texts using the book 'How to be a World Explorer'. Once we have become mountaineering experts, we will be producing our own 'Mountaineers Guide' leaflets.
