
PTFA Treasure Hunt











Peartree Class



















As you can see, in Peartree we really love our writing and are very proud of how beautiful our cursive handwriting is after only learning it for three weeks!


We have much more great writing planned and each hope to complete a booklet for our display board by next week.

Orchard Class

Over the past few weeks in maths, we have been focusing on fractions. We can now find fractions of different shapes, amounts, amounts within shapes and count in fractions too. Here we are using apple pieces to help us with counting in thirds.





In English, we have been reading Lila and the Secret of Rain by David Conway. We inferred the character's thoughts and feelings using the pictures and speech from the text. Next, we described the setting focusing on our use of expanded noun phrases. Our drama activities helped us to imagine the sweltering sun, the towering mountain and the endless pathway that Lila endured on her journey. We are excited to write our own African Folk Tales inspired by this story later on in the week.

In RE, we have been exploring what a miracle is and learning about some of the miracles that Jesus performed. We have been thinking very deeply about whether or not they are true and the lessons which they teach Christians. We have considered whether just any one can perform a miracle and learnt about some incredible people. Last week, we learnt about Helen Keller who was an American author and teacher. Despite being blind and deaf, she was able to invent her own communication methods and teach them to others. We thought this was extraordinary and felt inspired to learn some British Sign Language too. Check out our finger spelling!

Haffydown Class


In Science this week, the children classified rocks on the basis of their simple physical properties. In groups, we examined igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic rocks. These included obsidian, granite, sandstone, limestone and marble. To discover if the rock was permeable or impermeable, we placed water onto it to see if water would pass through. To test the durability of rocks, we used sandpaper to observe if the rocks were resistant to weathering. Finally, to test the rocks density, we placed them into water to see if they would float. Year Three had great fun experimenting.







Over the last two weeks, Year Three have been having fun rewriting the story *Mini Rabbit Not Lost*. Haffydown have been focusing on time adverbs, using conjunctions and paragraphing to retell the story of Mini Rabbit's long and humorous journey to find berries for a cake. We have played conjunction bingo, clambered around the room and role played. Their final pieces are amazing; we are very proud of them!

Puddlebridge Class




