Our new topic this half term in 'Growing'. This week we've got some new, special arrivals in our classroom...meet our new class caterpillars!


We are excited to observe the changes in our caterpillars over the next few weeks as they turn into beautiful butterflies!

We have also been learning and retelling the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and have planted our very own 'magic beans'. We will observe these each day to watch them grow and record the changes we see in our bean diaries!

In maths, we have also been using our 'magic beans' to help us with our addition sums!









Peartree Class

Here we go again with another action packed half term. You will all have received the termly newsletter sent home on Monday detailing what is happening throughout the term. If you have any questions, please drop a message on Seesaw.



In science, we have planted our broad bean seeds and are going to observe the changes they make over time. We are also investigating what a bean needs to grow into a healthy plant. We decided to plant some extra bean seeds and change one thing that happens to it. One will have no soil; one will have no water and one will have no light. We made our predictions about what we thought would happen



Our DT topic started last week where we had to evaluate some existing products (dips!)

We used plain bread sticks to sample several dips and had to describe the look and texture, the smell and finally the best part the taste. There was raita, tzatziki, hummus, non-spicy salsa, guacamole and thousand island. We also talked about where they originated from and found it on a map which helped our locational knowledge skills for geography.

Next, we will be evaluating some dippers before moving onto learning about eating a healthy and balanced diet. We will then use this knowledge to help us design and make our own healthy dip with accompanying dippers.






In phonics, we have been encouraging the children to look for digraphs (two letters that make one sound) and trigraphs (three letters that make one sound) in words to help them with decoding unfamiliar words. We have introduced them to our 'alien' words (all have a picture of an alien on them) to help them practice this decoding skill. The children look for the different sounds in a word and then they blend them together to read the word. I will be putting some examples onto Seesaw for the children to practise at home.

The children are all learning cursive script and being encouraged to use it in all writing. They really enjoy this and are trying so hard. I am loving all of the home practice that is being sent in. Thank you all for the extra time spent on this.







Orchard Class

Welcome back for our final term this year. The summer term is always packed full of fun events. I am so pleased now life is back to "normal" that the children will get to experience all the fun that the summer term at Aston brings! Please look in book bags for the class termly newsletter which was sent home on Monday.

In English this week, we have been reading 'The Day The Crayons Quit'. This hilarious and cleverly written story contains a series of persuasive letters written by Duncan's frustrated crayons. We had great fun exploring their different emotions through role play. Can you guess how the crayons are feeling in the freeze frames below?









During our maths lessons, we have been looking at fractions. We can now identify halves, thirds and quarters of shapes. The pictures show our Cuisenaire walls that we built to demonstrate this understanding. Next in the sequence, we are learning to find fractions of amounts.








Haffydown Class

In English, we have started a new book, *Mini Rabbit Not Lost*. We have been rewriting the story to publish our own version and have been working on our vocabulary choices. As the rabbit is travelling through many dangerous places, Year 3 acted out and used powerful verbs with prepositions to create an image of the exact moment in the reader's mind. They clambered up hills, rowed across unforgiving seas and

bounded through forests – quite an adventure!

In Science, we have started our new topic on rocks and soils. We have been exploring the three different types of natural rocks, igneous, metamorphic and sedimentary and how they are formed. We had fun using starbursts to create the rock cycle. This showed how rocks are made and can become another type of rock through compaction and cementation, weathering and erosion, and melting.



Just before Easter, Haffydown made hot cross buns with a twist. We based our final products on our market research, where we discovered the different textures, smells, taste and appearance that we found appealing. We also attempted different shapes with salt dough. Year 3 soon discovered that salt dough was easier to mould than the hot cross bun dough. Their final results were yummy and you can see from their faces their favourite part of the day was eating their creations.









Puddlebridge Class

We are so excited to be back in school for the Summer Term!

In English, we have been reading Cloud Tea Monkeys by Elspeth Graham and Mal Peet. Our work has focused heavily on how writing impacts the reader, so we have been working hard to include as much detail in our writing as possible. We also revised the use of inverted commas to record dialogue in a narrative. In order to prepare for our writing, we took part in a short drama activity to get our ideas flowing!






In Maths, we have been exploring area and perimeter. In this photo, you can see a group of us predicting and then testing how many Maths books would fit into a square meter.

In Science, Year 4 have started a new topic about Living Things and Their Habitats. We explored our school environment to find out what is living here. We took time to sketch the different species of plants and animals accurately, making careful observations.



Danes Class



Danes class have made an excellent start to the new term; we are already enjoying our new history topic about the Mayan civilization. In art, we have been focussing on perspective drawing; we began with one point perspective and then moved on to using two vanishing points. Our final piece was to draw a Mayan temple – the results were extremely impressive and clearly demonstrated the progress made through the sequence of lessons.

In science, we are learning about the human circulatory system. We began by learning about the heart and drew some amazing, labelled diagrams. Next, we learnt what is meant by 'double circulation' as oxygenated blood is pumped to the body and de-oxygenated blood to the lungs.

We are loving our learning in English which is inspired by 'Arthur Spiderwick's Field guide to the Fantastical World Around You'. During this unit, we will be writing for many different purposes including: a warning poster, a freeverse poem, a diary entry, a live-action news report, a character description and an explanation. On Monday this week, we read about the malicious, mischievous Boggart. We thought about the chaos that he could cause in our classroom and shared our ideas using freeze frames. The children then produced some fantastic writing in role as a boggart!

Have you got working Smoke Detectors?

Please check you have working smoke detectors at home. You should have a smoke detector on every floor in your home, preferably in the hallways and close to bedrooms where possible. Check your detectors work once a week by pushing the button in the middle. Don't forget to change the battery once a year — pick a date that is memorable such as your birthday or Christmas so that you remember!

If you do not have smoke detectors at home, Herts Fire and Rescue will carry out a safe and well check for you. They will fit smoke detectors for you for free.

- It won't cost you a penny and it could save your life.
- All visits are agreed by appointment only at a time to suit you.
- . Only uniformed staff will visit and will always carry an ID card.



CO/Gas Safe

- Carbon monoxide is a colourless, odourless, and tasteless flammable gas that is slightly less dense than air.
- Unsafe gas appliances can cause gas leaks, fires, explosions and carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Ensure you know where to turn your gas off at the mains. It is usually situated close to your gas meter.

Ensure there is adequate ventilation in any rooms where gas appliances are situated.

Arrange for a Gas Safe registered engineer to check it over annually and repair/replace if necessary.

Contact a Qualified Gas Safe Engineer if you notice any of the following signs around your hoiler:

Increased condensation
Floppy yellow flame
Sooty stain in or around your
appliance

Consider fitting a Co2 detector in your home. It should be placed by the main source of Carbon Monoxide in your property such as next to the open fireplace or



BE SCHOOL SAFE!

The Governing body and the head teacher are responsible for the day-to-day running of the school and the management of all the systems, including fire safety.

FIRE SAFETY ADVICE FOR SCHOOLS

- 1. The estimated cost of a school fire in the UK is £2.8 million
- 2. 75% of school fires are the result of arson.
- 3. Children in the age group 10-16 are responsible for 50% of all deliberately set school fires.
- Pupils and ex pupils are generally responsible for deliberately set school fires
- Each year HFRS attends around 180 calls to fires in or around school premises.

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO REDUCE THE RISK

Good housekeeping is the key to reducing the risk of arson at your school. HFRS can work with you to assess the risk, where necessary, and can recommend actions you can take to reduce it. Things to look out for include

- 1. Litter
- 2. Graffitti
- 3. Minor and major break-ins
- 4. Minor arson incidents

The schools arson audit covers the following areas:

- Entry onto premises
- Entry into buildings
- Opportunity to start a fire
- Scope to start a fire
