

Our School Choir Perform at The Royal Albert Hall Sunday 30th April 2023

An update on site and road naming ideas for the development of Land East of Gresley Way

I am writing this letter on behalf of Redrow, to provide you with an update on the ideas for site road names that pupils of Aston St Mary's Primary School shared, for the new development off Gresley Way.

As you may recall, in 2018, Leader of East Herts District Council, Councillor Linda Haysey asked students at your school to suggest names for the site, then known as Land East of Gresley Way, and its roads. As we noted to the children in November 2021, Redrow was very impressed with the students' suggestions and subsequently passed them on to the District Council, who make the final decision as to what street names are used in the local area.

We are very happy to let you know that the District Council has now granted Redrow permission to use a number of the children's ideas. Whilst we are conscious that some of the children who suggested these names have now left Aston St Mary's, we wanted to reach out to you in the first instance to share this news. The names that the children suggested back in 2018 and a site plan for Redrow's first housing phase which highlights the District Council's approved road names are attached for reference.

In recognition of the children's efforts and interest in this project, Redrow are pleased to provide a £200 book voucher as a thank-you for the children's successful road names. Redrow would be delighted for the school to use the voucher towards updating the reading material in the classroom reading comers or library area.

School Council Update



We are delighted to have received a £200 Book

We are constantly buying new books for classes and our school library so this voucher will enable us to purchase lots of new books for the children to enjoy.



Times Table Rockstars

We are so impressed by the progress being made by many children in Year Two upwards in securing their recall of multiplication facts using Times Tables Rockstars. Children in Year Four will soon be taking their multiplication check - this is a government test for all pupils in Year Four. The expectation is that, by the end of Year Four, children are fluent up to 12 x 12. We now have many children achieving this level of fluency by the end of Year Three or even Year Two - regular practise on TTRS really is the key to success. We are very proud that Aston St. Mary's is currently ranked third in the top thirty nearby schools (one of the schools ahead of us is a secondary school!).

Keep up the great work - securing fluency really does impact positively upon learning across the maths curriculum.

Shackadell Class

This week, Shackadell have been learning about the human life cycle. The children have had great fun looking closely at themselves in the mirror to draw self-portraits. They have also written about different stages of their own life cycle and sequenced pictures. They had lots of fun matching the baby photos to each child and their teachers! They have also been role playing in the baby clinic, measuring and weighing their babies and making their own 'red books'.



Last Friday, the children were able to bring in a baby or teddy from home to apply this week's learning. We made sure to have feeding times, nap times, story times and even a tour of the school! We were so impressed by the beautiful sharing and kind words from all the children and everyone's 'can do' attitude when looking after their baby or pet. Some children used the iPads to take pictures of their babies and others made mobiles for their cots.



It has been such a good week of learning and the children have really displayed so many of our school values.

Peartree Class

We are now well into the first part of the summer term, and we have a lot of exciting things coming up.

We have enjoyed our DT lessons where we tasted and evaluated salads; we also planned, made and evaluated our own salads. We used several different techniques when preparing our salads.

We have also been learning about what plants need to grow and have planted our sunflower seeds.

We think that plants need soil, sunlight and water to grow into healthy plants. We have set up an experiment to test this by changing one thing with some other seeds. We are changing one thing to make it a fair test. We have planted one seed with no soil, one with no water and the last with no sunlight. Most of our plants that have all the things we think they need are beginning to grow already.







In English, we are looking at a new book by Julia Donaldson, which is based on a Chinese traditional tale. This is linked to our geography and art topics about China.



We look forward to sharing all the exciting work we will be doing over the next few weeks.

Haffydown Class


It has been a busy start to the summer term, and we hope the children are looking forward to their learning for the term ahead. As part of our DT, the children designed and created their own smoothie. We discussed the importance of balanced diet and how to include a variety of fruit and vegetables in their meals. For the research, we tried different smoothies. Once they had decided what to include in their smoothie, the children then prepared the fruit and vegetables. This was a great opportunity for them to practise their cutting skills with a knife. Finally, they tried their smoothies - they all looked delicious!



At the start of the term, we started a new book called Atlas of Adventures and we have explored a variety of different places around the world. Last week, the children wrote and performed a radio broadcast about different festivals. The festivals included: Holi festival in India, the Hot Air Balloon festival in Canada and Rio Carnival in Brazil. They should be very proud of their performance reading. 







In English, we have been reading The Eye of the Wolf by Daniel Pennac. Part of the story is set across Africa; we each chose a different African country to research to help us to understand the context of the story. It has also helped up to develop our locational knowledge of the continent.











In Maths, Year 4 have been learning about fractions, while Year 5 have been exploring percentages.









Year 4 have started our new Science unit, Living Things and their Habitats'. We have learned about the seven life processes that all living things do (MRS NERG). We then learned how scientist classify living things by studying branching databases. After exploring our local environment, we created our own branching databases to classify the different minibeasts living on the school field.

Danes Class



In English, we have been writing persuasive speeches to encourage people to reduce their use of single-use plastic. We were inspired by the book 'One Plastic Bag' by Miranda Paul. This tells the inspiring story of Isatou Ceesay and the recycling women of The Gambia. We enjoyed learning all about The Gambia as well as reading the thought-provoking tale of ecological awareness and recycling. We have now completed our sequence of science lessons about the properties and changes of materials. We have learnt about reversible and irreversible changes – we were amazed to discover that dissolving a solute in a solvent can actually be reversible. To test this, we heated some salt solution over a candle; eventually the water evaporated, and the salt was left behind. Observing the irreversible, chemical reaction between vinegar and bicarbonate of soda was great fun! There were so many bubbles that the cup overflowed. The bubbles showed that a new material (carbon dioxide) had been produced meaning that we had observed an irreversible change.



In History, we are learning about Thomas Clarkson and the Transatlantic Slave Trade. We have been shocked to discover how enslaved people were treated and how they were traded for goods and shipped across the Atlantic Ocean in appalling conditions to work on plantations in the Americas. Thomas Clarkson was an abolitionist who devoted his life to ending the enslavement of human beings. There is a memorial to him not far from school – just a few miles away in the village of Wadesmill.



We would like to wish all of Year Six the very best of luck in their SATs assessments next week; they have worked incredibly hard throughout the year and have made excellent progress. This weekend it is important that they take a break and enjoy the coronation celebrations!

Children and young people are entitled to free regular dental and optician check ups and treatments. This includes orthodontic treatment if needed. Who we are

Hi, I am Katie, a Specialist Community Public Health Nurse (SCPHN) who works in the School Nursing team.

My role is to provide a link between school, home and the community, offering a health-focused perspective to improve the health and wellbeing of children and young people. Working in public health allows me to work in partnership with other professionals, supporting vulnerable families and facilitate health-enhancing behaviours.

The SCPHN programme allowed me to appreciate the value of our role in promoting and protecting the public's health by promoting healthy lifestyles.



Keeping safe in the community

Your child may be exposed to lots of different influences outside of home, for example their peers, friends, online activities and also in the community.

In most cases, these influences are very positive for a child and bring them opportunities to socialise, learn and thrive.

However, in some situations, some children may become involved in activities in their community that put them at risk of danger.

The best way to understand community risk and safety is to show an interest in what your child does when they are out of the home or online and creating a safe space for your children to talk to you about their experiences and how they feel.

Conversations with your child can help to tip the balance towards your child being safer.
